Alright, that is not going to happen, but we can start the new year with a demonstration on how to turn a cocktail smoker! Our demonstrator for the January meeting is our own Don Prorak who will show us how to make one. Drinks will have to be made at home.

Don joined our club in 2014 and has been an active member. He has chaired the Youth Mentoring program for the past five years. He was Vice President for two years. This past year he took on Group Buy and has agreed to return to his role as VP for next year. The excellent job he did as vice president, guiding those early Zoom meetings during Covid, deservedly earned him the Perkins Award in 2021.

Don bought his first house in 1980 and managed many of the needed projects with a variety of cheap hand tools kept in his small garage workshop. He added a Shopsmith to his arsenal and tried to learn to turn using the Shopsmith manual. In 2008, Don built his barn with a bigger work space. He liked turning and attended a class taught by Bruce Perry. After many conversations, Bruce welcomed Don into his shop and mentored him. Don joined the FRW and AAW and bought a Jet 12/36 and has since moved up to a Laguna 18/36. He also improved his sharpening technique over the Shopsmith disk sander once used. He confessed that in the beginning he worried he would ruin that nice factory edge on the gouge by sharpening!

His career of performing and teaching music is a natural segue into his desire now to perform woodturning demonstrations and teach newer turners the craft. Don explained that he is indebted to many turners for sharing their knowledge. Mentoring others is his way of giving back to those who taught him. One thing he is adamant about is that all turners should JOIN A CLUB! Don continues taking classes, and attends every symposium he can.

Don still enjoys the simplicity of roughing out green bowls. But as his skill set improved, so has the complexity of his art. Today Don likes to make winged pieces and multi-axis items that are inspired by Barbara Dill, Cindy Drozda, Rudy Lopez, and others. He recently made several multi-axis tap handles for some local brewing enthusiasts. He has made many off-center bowls (sometimes intentionally!). Some of his bowls and lidded boxes feature double tri-corner with a captive ring. Don will soon attempt a handle for a ring box that is double tri-corner with a captive ring from a 1" cube of wood. Inspired by his recent workshop with Trent Bosch & Laurent Niclot, Don is experimenting with pyrography, power carving, and other surface enhancements in his work. This demo is in return for the PHEOG grant he received in 2022 to attend that workshop.

Industrial Abrasives - send orders to Jay Miller Industrial Abrasives is our principal vendor for sanding supplies. Prices for hook & loop mandrels and discs remain the lowest in the marketplace and their backing is a heavier weight than the competition.

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping and handling essentially free.

Craft Supplies - send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.



Gordon Dalby made gifts for his grandson brothers. Wood was taken from one bowl and placed in the

other bowl so they always realize they are connected. With inspiration from John Beaver, the bowls are 9-1/2" x 6-1/2", of zebra and wenge woods.

made this 10x5" sycamore salad bowl from a highly warped wet-turned blank. The bowl was multi-axis rotated and turned to less warped; the brown paper

is the original outline. She rather likes the warped rim. The finish is walnut oil. Thanks to Pat Scott for the blank.

The 5x2" camphor hollow form has an (India ink/lacquer) Schacht

maple finial. The camphor finish is Danish wood oil and carnauba.

The 5x3" elm hollow form was turned and carved as part of Trent Bosch's great November class in his shop.

The finish is acrylic, mica, and lacquer.

Here are two doggie urns for Bernese Mountain Dogs made by **Larry Hughes**. Each urn contains 396 segments of sapele, maple and burned poplar. The upper and lower parts



of the urns have been ebonized, then sanded to different degrees and finished with many layers of polyurethane.



Beginning turner **Viki Lawrence** just turned her first bowl. She had lots of guidance from her friend Mike Paulson from Fort Collins.

Jessica Edwards took some time off from gnomes and trees to make a Viking-themed German incense smoker for her husband's birthday. It's mostly made from maple and all parts were turned on the lathe and then textured, burned and colored. Her 7-year-old daughter helped with the coloring and beard, too!

Kim Komitor made this 6x4" lidded hollow form of box elder burl, walnut, ebony, turquoise bead and lots of CA glue! He had roughed it out around five years

ago, then started to work on it recently. But when he saw all the potential problems, it sat for another three or four months before a lot of CA glue and giving it a try.

Henry Williams made these gnomes based on Jessica Edwards' demonstration. They're appropriately 6" tall, of walnut, maple, and



bubinga. He also made a couple more owls based on Cindy Drozda's IRD, approximately 8" tall using maple and mother of pearl.





Santa's workshop (at Craig Choun's) has been busy turning bowls, bottle stoppers and ornaments. The woods included ash, maple, elm and cherry. Finishes included General Finishes Wood Bowl Finish,

Mahoney's Walnut Oil and Wax, spray lacquer and Myland's Friction Polish.

After Scott DeWeese and his wife returned from a recent trip to Ireland and Scotland, he decided to make some 12" maple bowls and platters with Celtic designs. These are maple wide-rimmed bowls and platters with carving, pyrography, India ink and/or paint. They are finished with either walnut oil, Waterlox or spray satin lacquer.
