APRIL DEMONSTRATOR –STUART BATTY Tuesday, April 4th–In Person and via Zoom

Stuart Batty is a third generation apprenticed woodturner with over 40 years of experience. Under the expert tutelage of his father Allan Batty, a worldrenowned master spindle turner, Stuart began turning at the age of ten. By the age of 16, Stuart had become an accomplished production spindle turner and instructor and had gained wide notoriety for his technical proficiency and teaching abilities. Stuart has taught more classes and demonstrated at more clubs and symposiums than any other woodturner in history and is recognized as one of the world's most accomplished woodturners.

Through years of production turning and teaching hands-on woodturning classes, Stuart developed a unique style of the European push-cut technique using fewer tools and simpler grinds to totally eliminate torn grain, requiring less physical effort, and enabling rapid, repeatable cuts. Stuart has pioneered many of the techniques and terminologies that all woodturners use today such as the push-cut, pull-cut, negative rake scraping, 40/40 and bottom bowl gouge grinds.

Stuart's work includes balustrades and newel posts in Royal and Stately British Homes and a piece in the White House Permanent Collection. He is now focused on teaching classes to help students improve their woodturning technique.

Stuart's methodology is focused on teaching a set of universal skills which can be used to make any workpiece on the lathe. It is not focused on product, but on correct technique and process.

HANDS-ON WOODTURNING

The Front Range Woodturners' H.O.W. (Hands on Woodturning) class held in Rockler's classroom on Tuesday March 14th was taught by Jessica Edwards. The process involved mounting a bowl blank of green wood on the lathe incorporating either a worm screw, faceplate or between centers. Most chose either the worm screw or faceplate.

Jessica turned the bottom of her bowl complete with the bottom tenon while attendees watched. Attendees then turned the bottoms on their blanks. Once the class caught up with Jessica, we wrapped the started bowls in plastic and broke for lunch.

When we returned to reverse our bowl blanks, we discovered that the bottoms had moved significantly and needed to be turned trued again as the green wood had moved. Once round again, Jessica demonstrated a shear scraping and taught the class how to wet-sand using abranet sandpaper and water.

Once the bottom was sanded smooth, Jessica reversed her bowl and turned down the wall of her bowl so thin that a light showed through the fibers of the wood. She explained that she needed to hollow and wet-sand a third at a time because with a wall thickness that thin, the wood would become unstable and wobble. Once the wall thickness (or rather thinness) is determined there is no going back. Admittedly, we were all surprised at how fast the wet wood dried. With her bowl completed, we turned ours. Jessica then showed the class how to part the bowl off and complete the bottom. All completed their extremely thin-walled bowls.

The basic premise of the H.O.W. class is for attendees to watch a woodturning demonstration and replicate, in real time, each step of the process to make the item being created. Unlike watching a demonstration and trying to remember HOW to make it when home, the H.O.W participants follow the leader.

Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.

Perpetual Turning: At the

March meeting, **Rick Orr** brought a bolt and nut which was claimed by Dale Sherman with his raffle ticket. So Dale will bring a turning for our April meeting and whoever takes that piece (with a winning raffle ticket) will bring a turning of their own for the May meeting.







Tom Fremgen made this 12" x 7" piece from red cedar and finished it with Mylands sanding sealer and friction polish. It's not quite finished, he needs to cut off the base after some wax.

Keith Motzner turned

this piece from the base of a stump or root cap that came from Buena Vista. If you look closely at photo #3 you will see one of the rocks that was hiding in one of the pockets next to a root. All the crevices were full of dirt. sand and rocks. He thought he had all of them picked out but missed one. It showed up soon enough and dulled his tools. If you get a chance to turn piñon pine, you will be treated with a lemony fragrance and a very stable and enjoyable wood to turn. He finished the 7-1/4" x 3" piece with Glenn Lucas bowl finish wax.







Debra Higley Feldman made an 8" maple burl bowl with a maple/acrylic ring. The finish is Danish oil/carnauba wax. She also made a 6" redwood bowl with a maple/ acrylic/captive ring base finished with walnut

oil. She put the ring on the maple bowl because it looked unbalanced, so now it looks slightly less unhinged.

Donna Kitchens turned two eccentric pendants hung with linen cord and two torus pendants, all out of ebony finished with sanding sealer. She also turned three French rolling pins-a 16" cherry pin, an 18" walnut pin and an 18" segmented pin of maple and mystery wood. All are finished with Walrus Oil and Wax which are 100% food safe.







"Don't play with Super Glue" – Dr. Spock Blaine Blaesing made his first segmented bowl from cedar fence post scraps which were oriented in different ways to showcase the variety



of grain patterns and colorations. He also turned a small acorn box, again out of cedar scraps, then **Brenda Blaesing**

textured it with woodburning. She did more woodburning, carving and painting on this 5" tall bird.





Steve Claycomb has been working on natural-edge, three-winged bowls. The first one is made from Russian olive and the second from locust. He hasn't applied the finish vet.

After creating a lot of pieces around the holidays (including a eucalyptus piece her son said smelled like death), Jill Rice is taking a break. Her shop is cleaner than it has ever been in 38 years. She sanded ancient drywall mud and used a Swiffer with 180 grit firm back for the ceiling with a tall step stool. Then she primed. Little did she know how much more work it was to move and cover everything for her son to spray. She's looking forward to messing the shop up again after she gets her taxes done. Her advice to members: It's time to clean the top of light fixtures!

Curt Vogt was so happy to attend the FRW March meeting, see so many familiar faces and get to meet some new folks too. A main part of his visit to Colorado was to spend some shop time with a woodturner friend. The first day they went over some of his goals and Curt showed him how to sharpen three of his most used tools. The next thing he know,



got back home (west of Austin in the Texas Hill Country), he did his own batch of turning with wood from the trees that fell in a big ice storm about a month ago. He made some rough-out blanks to set aside and dry. He plans to use them for Christmas ornaments.
