
On April 22nd, **Robyn Herman** hosted a shop tour at her home in Lakewood. There was a great turnout and everyone enjoyed the day.

HANDS-ON WOODTURNING

The Front Range Woodturner's H.O.W. (Hands on Woodturning) class was held in Rockler's Classroom on Tuesday April 18th with a second class on April 25th. **Pat Scott** generously offered the second date because many people wanted to learn how to turn an 8" pepper mill.

Pat began the class by explaining that a pepper mill only takes four steps to complete. Step 1 is to turn

a 3" x 3" x 9" stock round between centers. A tenon or spigot is cut into each end and then the rounded spindle is cut into 5" and 3" pieces. Each cut piece requires a tenon or spigot on both ends.

The second step is to drill a series of holes using sized forstner bits and drill bits into each half. Pat could not overemphasize the importance of accuracy during this step. If not drilled straight, the mill will fail and all the work will have been for nothing. The drilled halves are then fitted together and measured for a precise length.

The class spent so much time measuring and drilling precisely, we did not complete step three which is to shape the outside of the mill. We also did not get to step four which is sanding and applying a finish. Instead, Pat spent the remaining class time explaining methods he uses in completing steps 3 and 4. Pat spent considerable time to ensure that each attendee would be able to finish their mill at home with confidence.



Well, at least we started. Now finish the mills at home.

Class dismissed!

The basic premise of the H.O.W. class is for attendees to watch a woodturning demonstration and replicate, in real time, each step of the process to create the item being created. Unlike watching a demonstration and trying to remember HOW to make it when home, the H.O.W participants follow the leader.

YOUTH MENTORING

We have resumed Youth Mentoring with a sixweek pilot program at Colorado STEM Academy, meeting on Monday afternoons. We began with cutting boards, and will next turn handles for butter knives to compliment the boards, all with an emphasis on safety and solid basics. CSA has a wellequipped shop, augmented with our lathes and turning tools, and we're having a lot of fun with a great group of students!

All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

A beginning turner, **Lee Lindsay** made this 10"
maple bowl after only
three months of turning.

Debra Higley-Feldman made some spinning tops and a bird (?) house ornament from Schacht maple

and satinwood. The finishes are shellac, watercolor, and walnut oil.



Jill Rice made this 10" claro walnut bowl, finished with General Finishes wood finish. She also made an 11" square-edge bowl of spalted birch. The wood is bare in the photo, but then she used GF Arm-R-Seal to finish it. That darkened it considerably but also brought out the medullary rays and other grain.







Dennis Fanning made this large 15" maple bowl. The wide textured rim was colored with black ink and gold gilding wax.

Joe Levy made a salt cellar for his wife. It's 3.5" in diameter and made from walnut with a tulipwood finial. The scoop is made from holly. All were finished with Drs Woodshop wax bowl finish.

made pin cushions of walnut and Russian olive (she thinks). They are filled with crushed walnut shells which clean and sharpen the pins as well as keep them at hand.

After making her first bowl last month at the LOTL class, **Cathie McLean** was inspired by the pretty pinstriped blanks used that day. So she decided to make her own blank, combining cedar and poplar. She finished the bowl with butcher block conditioner.

Curt Vogt has continued to make hollowed-out ornaments from the branches and trees that came down in the February ice storm. Not having much experience turning wet wood, he learned new things. Shown are a vessel with 3/8" opening, a 2 1/4" diameter box with a domed lid. and three hollow ornaments with cherry top caps. As a birthday gift, Curt decided his friend needed a nicer depth gauge than the stick/bambool skewer he had been using. So he made one of bocote and curly maple. It has a brass insert and knob to secure the 1/4" diameter stainless steel rod in place. Everything was

finished with a true lacquer because of the natural oils in the bocote.

Henry Williams practiced his box turning skills with Cindy Drozda's Opal Tower Box design. Around 3"





tall, they were made from cherry and manufactured opal.
