

The May 20th LOTL was a tour of Debra Higley's shop. We had cookies and biscotti while discussing advantages and disadvantages of a 120 sq ft custom Tuff shed, favorite woods and tools, and that wood hoarding is healthy. On June 6th from 10:00 to 4:00. Robert Brewer from Pikes Peak Woodturners will be giving a Tips and Tricks demo for LOTL at Rockler. We will discuss tools, different ways to sand, simple and complex embellishments, mounting bowl and platter blanks, and overall how to improve our turning skills.

The 'July' LOTL will instead be Saturday June 17th at Larry Hughes shop, starting at 10 am. The topic is segmented turning and jigs. He will have some precut bowls and other pieces for us to learn at least one method of building the rings. Larry will have handouts and will show use of a miter saw in cutting the pieces, turning tricks, finishing cuts, sanding, and applying poly-type finishes. We'll have pieces to practice on at home.

If you're a woodworker as well as woodturner, you may know about the 45-degree rule. It goes like this: a clamp exerts a force that radiates out across a triangular region of the wood that forms a right angle-45 degrees on each side of the clamp's point of contact. So, to ensure that force is applied as evenly as possible across the entire glue joint, clamps should be spaced so that these force triangles overlap. It's a handy rule, especially for the woodworker looking to justify the purchase of more clamps; you can never have too many clamps. But is it valid? Watch the video in this link to find out.



All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.



**Eric Kloor** spent the winter in Wanaka. New Zealand. Here are two photos of a Swamp Kauri bowl he turned. What's remarkable about the wood is that it's around 50,000 years old. From Wiki: "Swamp kauri, sometimes marketed as "ancient kauri". are prehistoric kauri trees (Agathis australis), buried and preserved in peat up to 50.000 years ago in New





Zealand's North Island. Buried under a peat swamp by an unexplained act of nature at the end of the last Ice Age, the trees have survived the centuries underground, sealed in a chemically balanced environment that has preserved the timber in almost perfect condition." The trees grew for nearly 2000 years before they were buried. Some have a girth of around 40 feet and a total height of nearly 200 feet.



Sonny Jones completed this thin-walled maple bowl from Jessica Edward's HOW class. It's 9" in diameter and 1/8" thin from top to bottom. Thanks for the great class, Jessica!

## Debra Higley turned this 8.5" bowl from larvae-gnawed wood raffle walnut and African mahogany. The finish is



Jill Rice made a 6" bowl of spalted sycamore. A small crack caused a design change on the rim. She added lots of detail on the rim because the recipient is losing her eyesight. Jill also made a 6" winged bowl of canary wood. This super dense wood turned incredibly well even with a fairly dull gouge





initially. She couldn't have asked for the sap wood to line up any more evenly, more the blank cutter's doing than hers, she said.



Inspired by Vinny's demo last month, **Rick Cantwell** burned a weave pattern into a bowl rim using a laser engraver. Made from aspen, the bowl is about 5" in diameter.

**Brenda Blaesing** got bold with color on this 5" ash bowl which was rough-turned in a Stuart Batty class

over a year ago. She burned lines following the grain pattern, then added various shades of dye in between the lines.

Chuck Kubin made this piece he calls "Sunrise Over the 14ers." It's 20" high and 5.5" in diameter at the base. Ancient peoples believed the mountains were home to the gods, prayed to the sun and honored all three through spires and obelisks. This column pays tribute to the sun rising over Colorado's 53 natural monuments towering more than 14,000 feet. Egyptian inspired, Ramev Homestead black walnut was tapered using the lost wood technique from round to a cat's-eye profile; linden base and crucible; apple sphere; distressed gold leaf; hidden malachite cabochon (rumored to restore good luck and fertility and to cure the fear of flying).

Blaine Blaesing made this 6" diameter willow box, inlaid with turquoise along a crack. The finial is made from Scacht maple, dyed black with India ink.
