JULY DEMONSTRATOR – LAURENT NICLOT Tuesday, July 5th– Live /Zoom Hybrid

Our July presenter is Laurent Niclot. Originally from Toulon in the south of France, he is currently living and working in Fort Collins. He has always loved wood, so it was only natural for him to study woodworking, woodcarving, cabinet making, furniture making, and design. He discovered woodturning from Jean-François Escoulen, and knew it was how he wanted to make a living. So, in 2015, at age 20, he took the six-month woodturning class at the Escoulen School in Aiguines, France, with Jean-François and Yann Marot. Then, the school hired Laurent as an assistant and translator for three years, gave him a studio and a lathe to practice his passion, and the possibility to meet many other artists and woodturners who now inspire his work.

Laurent's work is experimental--he likes to play with the wood and try new textures and colors, new tools, and new techniques. He also enjoys giving new life to a piece of wood. He carves with rotary tools and gouges to create new shapes and textures. His aim is to make pieces that are sculptural, decorative, and designed with a strong message or a story to tell. He also enjoys collaborating with other artists, creating pieces with a strong story and working with materials or techniques that he wouldn't be able to do on his own. It allows him to see his work with a different eye and evolve, learn and share an experience with that person.

For our demo, Laurent will follow up on his tea pot demo by showing multi-axis turning and carving the tea drop from the tea pot. See more

Powermatic Lift Lock n' Roll mobility system for 3520 A/B model lathes (also fits Jet 1642). Attaches to the bottom of the legs between the feet pads and



legs. I bought this to move my lathe and haven't used them since doing that. They are no longer made, Packard Woodworks sold their last set for \$450, I'm asking \$300.

Fein Turbo III Vacuum model 9.77.25. 15 gallon, 1.5 hp, 125 cfm, 57.8 db (quiet!), wet/dry vac with auto (tool) start. Includes all attachments pictured, a brand new Oneida Dust Deputy cyclone and brand new HEPA filter. The vacuum originally came with a cloth bag filter, I upgraded to a HEPA filter and never used it. I intended to incorporate the Dust Deputy with the vac but never got around to it. I



bought a Festool vac about the same time as I got the Fein and only used the Fein a few times. Asking \$250.

STARGATE LATHE CLUB

The Stargate Lathe Club was started by Stephen Pegler roughly six years ago with the assistance of a Pete Holtus Educational Opportunity Grant (PHEOG), donations from Front Range Woodturners members, and mentoring by Don Prorak. The club is open to Stargate students in middle and high school. Although COVID disrupted the club the last few years, we had tremendous participation this year. We started out with 13 new students and then settled to six to eight students for most of the year. This was to be expected as we currently only have five lathes in service. Toward the end of the year we lost some students to theater and sports, but gained a new mentor, Devon Lindsley.

The club members made some amazing progress this year. We started with basic spindle work and made Halloween decorations and honey dippers. Then we moved on to tops, bowls, and finished up the year with goblets. When you consider that none of the students started with any turning experience and that some are as young as 10 years old, that really is quite an accomplishment. A couple of the students have either bought or are planning to buy lathes for home use. Toward the end of the year we started inviting the students to join us for FRW meetings. I'm hopeful that some will join us over the summer or via zoom.

Over the summer, we hope to build some lathe stands as many of the stands we have are just too high for our students. We are also planning to buy another lathe with funds from the PHEOG award. We believe the school will also buy some safety equipment and other tools.

One of the best things about the club is how many students we reach directly and indirectly. Our lathe club members teach many other students at Stargate. It is very common for the teachers to pair up a lathe club member with someone who wants to learn how to turn. While the exact number is difficult to determine, I would estimate that at least 100 students (and possibly more) have been introduced to woodturning through this program.

I'd like to thank Don Prorak, Mr. Varel, Dr. Pegler, Bruce Perry, Devon Lindsley, Mickey Jackson, the PHOEG committee, and all of the FRW members who have supported this wonderful program. With the strong, ongoing commitment you've made to the program, so many kids have had the opportunity to learn woodturning.



Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.

Bear and Alisa Limvere

collaborated on these plates. Bear did the turning and Alisa did the glue-up. Between 6 and 7" across, they are Bubinga with various stops of purple heart, maple, walnut and others. The hollow form is Colorado aspen.





After recovering from hand surgery, **Larry Hughes** has turned 30 bowls and vases. In one of our recent demonstrations, he remembered a comment

about not wanting to turn a funnel. He decided to turn some funnel-based vases to show that funnels are not a bad thing. The walnut vase has 576 segments and stands 9.25" tall, the mahogany vase has 342 segments and stands 6.25" tall and the geo vase has 594 segments and stands 7.5" tall. All three of these are highlighted with padauk and maple rings.











Dennis Fanning made

Gordon Dalby first made a multiaxis holly and ebony 3x5" vase for a neighbor, then made this one for his grandson by request.

The other vase is Colorado spalted aspen, about 8" tall.









Chuck Kubin created this piece in a Trent Bosch workshop. It's 5.5"x4.25" ash, with a bare sapwood pierced feature. Lessons learned: turning thin but thick enough to accommodate carving, easily creating the scalloped texture, and multi layering paint to accent texture. Marty Christensen made these pens as part of Rocky Mountain Woodturners pen turning group's contribution to the Honor Flight program.



Then he got to do some turning and made some seam rippers for his wife to take to her quilting retreat in July. They are all some sort of acrylic or resin, turned to shape, sanded to 1200 and then finished with Dr. Kirks 3-stage polish.



Debra Higley-

Feldman made this 13x4" myrtle and walnut bowl. The tree was probabbly killed in a fire because it was fire hardened. The finish is Danish



wood oil and minwax, and minor acrylic paint.



Jason Matisheck made an ash handle for his garden gate latch. He also wet-turned a box elder bowl about 5" in diameter.



Mickey Jackson has started to build hickory cabinets for a kitchen remodel. He has many more to do but these first ones are in a place where there were no cabinets before.
