>Turning Challenge

The turning challenge for March was to make a vortex bowl.. The winners are: Beginner: **Rick Cantwell**, and Intermediate: **Scott Highland**. There were no entries for the Advanced level. Photos of their pieces are in the Gallery below.

The turning challenge for April is an end-grain bowl or some kind (bowl, box, vase, es.). Bonus points for making it with a hook tool that you made after watching how **Alan Lacer** made one at last month's meeting.

The rules for our monthly turning challenge are:

- Self-assess your level of turning (Beginner, Intermediate or Advanced). Do not judge your skill level by how long you have been turning.
- Fill out a Show-and-Tell form with your name, title of the piece, finish used, etc. All of the forms on our website are now interactive and can be filled out online and printed ahead of time. If you want, you can print a blank form and fill it out by hand, and we will also have blank forms at the meeting.
- The Show-and-Tell forms have a check box for "Turning Challenge" and "Show-and-Tell only". Check the appropriate box.
- To enter the turning challenge, there are 3 folders marked Beginner, Intermediate, and Advanced. Each folder has numbered slips of paper that are color coded to the skill level:

Beginner = Red Intermediate = Blue Advanced = Yellow

- Pick a bag of numbers from your respective skill folder it doesn't matter which number you pick. The Beginner folder only has red numbers, Intermediate only has blue numbers, etc.
- Write the number on your card in case things get mixed up, and place the bag with your numbers on top of your Show-and-Tell card (so people can vote for you). Do not throw the bag away!
- You cannot vote for yourself.

>Group Purchases and Individual Catalog Orders - Roger Holmes

INDUSTRIAL ABRASIVES: Industrial Abrasives (IA) is our principal sanding supplies vendor, but individual orders to Klingspor may also be member-processed (see details on the FRW website). Prices for Hook & Loop (H&L) mandrels, and H&L Discs remain the lowest in the marketplace, with the weight of the backing heavier than the competition.

Items on IA's Wholesale Price List but not on the FRW order sheet may be addressed on a case by case basis. Because S&H charges from Pennsylvania for oversized items are so expensive, ordering 1 yd x 1yd sheets of H&L, for example, is cost effective only if at least nine (9) sheets are ordered, resulting in a sheet cost of about \$17.25. With a pair of scissors and a little effort, 250 + 2.25" x 2.25" squares may be cut from each sheet, making the effective cost per disc about 7 cents. The squares may be affixed to a 2" mandrel, the corners clipped off, and the sides crimped around the mandrel - making sanding the inside of bowls much more efficient, and also making the mandrels last longer. The same process may be used for the 3" mandrels, using 3.25" squares.

Supplies of smaller sheets in 25 packs $(3.15" \times 4.5")$ – of the same H&L Aluminum Oxide, Stearate-coated material used in the discs, for \$2.50 + \$2

STARBOND. Starbond is our principal cyanocrylate (CA) glue vendor. Prices increased as of January 2019 (see new order sheets). Our minimum order is \$100, but if we order at a 200+ level, a 15% AAW-related discount kicks in, making S&H essentially free.

AAW Membership

The American Association of Woodturners (AAW) is our "mother" organization. FRW is a chapter of AAW. AAW has a separate membership fee and program from FRW with multiple benefits, not least of which is their quarterly American Woodturning magazine. See AAW's website at www.woodturner.org.

Make a Beads of Courage bowl in 2019!

- >Incorporate one of the Beads of Courage beads or write/burn *Beads of Courage* somewhere (bottom of box, inside of lid, side of bowl, etc.)
- >Bigger is better, kids may receive anywhere from a handful to thousands of beads. Minimum inside dimensions are 5" wide x 4" deep, but 6"x 5" and larger is better.
- >Square boxes are OK too. We are woodturners, but many of us are woodworkers as well.
- >Lids must have a knob, and make sure the knob is big enough for a child to easily grasp. Do not make a tight fitting lid.
- >Be proud of what you have made. Be sure to sign or print your name, date (month and year), and type of wood. You can also put a business card inside or print a card with your info to put inside. A personal note of encouragement goes a long way.
- >Do not use an oil finish inside the bowl. Shellac, wax, and water based poly is OK to use. For more information, please visit: www.beadsofcourage.org/pages/woodturners.html

Wooden apples (figure 1)

Typically most large turned bowls are filled with fresh fruit. I challenged myself to turn wooden apples and rather than having a bowl full of brown apples, I attempted to dye them with Aniline dye and that progressed into coloring and dying several types of fruit.

In the photo of wooden apples (figure 1), the apples are dyed red. Aniline dye powder, TransTint liquid dye, and water colors may be used for dying wood. A combination of all three may be used to achieve a desired effect. Work in a well ventilated area and follow all safety instructions on the product used. Have blank pieces of wood available to use as a practice canvas before applying color to the finished pieces because different wood species will color differently.

Aniline powder: Mix ¼ tsp powder with 1 ounce of water. Adding more or less powder will alter the intensity of the color. After sanding, apply color with a sponge brush. If mixing colors; start with the darker color first. Apply dye liberally and allow the color to dry for about ten minutes. Wipe down with a wet paper towel. Allow to dry. The water based dye will raise the grain. A light sanding will be necessary before proceeding to the next color (if using more than one color) or to apply final finish.

TransTint liquid dye: Liquid dyes are easier than powders because they do not have to dissolve. According to the directions, mix 1 ounce of TransTint dye to 1 quart of tap water, distilled water or alcohol. TransTint dye can also be added directly to any water based finish or solvent lacquer for a top coat finish. A quart is a lot of dying liquid. For smaller amounts, use distilled water in a plastic cup and add a few drops at a time. Apply both dyes in the method described above, but be sure to wear rubber gloves, goggles and a respirator. Complete safety instructions are on the back of the product and can be found at www.HomesteadFinishingProducts.com.

<u>Water colors:</u> Water colors can be purchased at any art supply store. Place a bit of the concentrated colors on a plastic plate and use a wet paintbrush to blend the colors until the desired shade is reached. Apply paint directly to the wood. An apple might be painted mostly red and shaded with yellow or light green for different high-lights. Try mixing red and green and yellow together on the plastic plate. If the color is too vibrant, paint the apple with some water on the brush to even out the colors.

After the apples are dry, a wipe-on poly will help to get that waxed fruit look. The peaches shown below were not sanded so that the raised grain would resemble peach fuzz.
