June Demonstration: Double Tri-corner: Theme & Variations by Don Prorak

This will be my first woodturning demo, and my "thank you" to Front Range Woodturners for the PHEOG grant that allowed me to take a 3-day workshop with **Keith Gotschall** at his shop in Salida, Colorado. I chose Keith because he is an excellent, creative turner. I also felt I could learn a lot from his teaching style to make me more effective in my role as the FRW Youth Mentor Chair.

I began turning tri-corner pieces about 3 years ago after seeing a video from Gwinnett Woodworkers. I made several variations on this concept, but was always looking at the other corners that were turned away. My first double tri-corner was a tea light holder. After **Jimmy Clewes'** demo last year, I got inspired to explore the idea further and made some bowls that also had double tri-corner handles on the lid. I've also made a hollowform, napkin rings, etc., and recently started adding a captive ring. I have a few more variations in mind for future projects, and want to encourage everyone to think outside the bowl!

Turning Challenge

The turning challenge for June is: A small bowl with a non-standard foot similar to what Merryll Saylan demoed. Texture, color, dye, burn, paint, or other surface enhancements encouraged.





The rules for our monthly turning challenge are:

- Self-assess your level of turning (Beginner, Intermediate or Advanced). Do not judge your skill level by how long you have been turning.
- Fill out a Show-and-Tell form with your name, title of the piece, finish used, etc. All of the forms on our website are now interactive and can be filled out online and printed ahead of time. If you want, you can print a blank form and fill it out by hand, and we will also have blank forms at the meeting.
- The Show-and-Tell forms have a check box for "Turning Challenge" and "Show-and-Tell only". Check the appropriate box.
- To enter the turning challenge, there are 3 folders marked Beginner, Intermediate, and Advanced. Each folder has numbered slips of paper that are color coded to the skill level:

Beginner = Red Intermediate = Blue Advanced = Yellow

- Pick a bag of numbers from your respective skill folder it doesn't matter which number you pick. The Beginner folder only has red numbers, Intermediate only has blue numbers, etc.
- Write the number on your card in case things get mixed up, and place the bag with your numbers on top of your Show-and-Tell card (so people can vote for you). Do not throw the bag away!
- You cannot vote for yourself.

>Group Purchases and Individual Catalog Orders - Roger Holmes

I have been researching pricing and styles for FRW T-shirts and Polo shirts. I am looking at having the T-shirts say *Front Range Woodturners* on them, and having the FRW logo embroidered on Polo shirts. We hope to have a sample made up of each shirt by the June meeting so you can see what they look like before ordering. T-shirts will be the same high quality shirts as sold at the RMWT Symposium.

INDUSTRIAL ABRASIVES: Industrial Abrasives (IA) is our principal sanding supplies vendor, but individual orders to Klingspor may also be member-processed (see details on the FRW website). Prices for Hook & Loop (H&L) mandrels, and H&L Discs remain the lowest in the marketplace, with the weight of the backing heavier than the competition.

Items on IA's Wholesale Price List but not on the FRW order sheet may be addressed on a case by case basis. Because S&H charges from Pennsylvania for oversized items are so expensive, ordering 1 yd x 1yd sheets of H&L, for example, is cost effective only if at least nine (9) sheets are ordered, resulting in a sheet cost of about \$17.25. With a pair of scissors and a little effort, 250 + 2.25" x 2.25" squares may be cut from each sheet, making the effective cost per disc about 7 cents. The squares may be affixed to a 2" mandrel, the corners clipped off, and the sides crimped around the mandrel - making sanding the inside of bowls much more efficient, and also making the mandrels last longer. The same process may be used for the 3" mandrels, using 3.25" squares.

Supplies of smaller sheets in 25 packs $(3.15" \times 4.5")$ – of the same H&L Aluminum Oxide, Stearate-coated material used in the discs, for \$2.50 + \$4.5", continue to be available.

STARBOND. Starbond is our principal cyanocrylate (CA) glue vendor. Prices increased as of January 2019 (see new order sheets). Our minimum order is \$100, but if we order at a 200+ level, a 15% AAW-related discount kicks in, making S&H essentially free.

>Librarian's Corner – Bob Britt

Answer to "Puzzler of the Month" – An Airbrush- Yes an airbrush can be used to apply make-up. Using special food safe coloring an airbrush is frequently used to decorate cakes and pastries (checkout your local supermarket bakery) and of course they can be used to create illustrations and accent turnings with detailed and colorful enhancements.

While there are many videos on YouTube, several airbrush DVDs have recently been added to your library. If you are just curious about airbrushing and how such a system works your library can be of assistance. If you are more serious or even have some experience with an airbrush your library resources can help with tips and tricks for the intermediate level artist. Then of course there is cleaning and trouble-shooting so that your equipment remains in tip top shape for the next project.

The late David Nittman (former FRW member) and Brian McEvoy have videos specifically about airbrushing on wood turnings but recent FRW Library additions have information about specific product lines as well as explaining some good exercises to get one started. There is even an airbrush system (COPICS) that utilizes markers rather than containers of liquid.






Making a Cowboy Hat - Ed "Sonny" Jones

Cowboy hats are not that difficult to turn. It is just a bowl with a large rim. Actually, it is a very thin bowl with a very thin rim or brim. Many tree species will work, but the piece must be green. The project below was made from Aspen.

To begin, find a log that measures at least as long as the diameter is wide. Determine the location of the pith and draw two parallel cut lines. The pith has to be removed. Mark another parallel line denoting outside bark to be removed. Note: if the log is oval or has an off center pith, cut the log to make the two widest half logs possible to get the two widest brims. (figure 1). Once cut, find the center and draw the outside circle to prepare for the band saw. (figures 2 & 3).




Determine the center on both sides. Mount between centers using a spur drive with the bark side facing the tail stock. (figure 4). Using a sweeping cut from the bottom toward the top, round over the blank as if starting a bowl. Note the dark line denoting more pith to be removed. (figure 5). Remove mass while shaping the outside of the hat. Be sure to leave a hat band. On some wood species the band may be burnished to a darker color with a strip of hard exotic wood such as rosewood or purple heart. This Aspen did not burnish and was left plain. Cut the top of the brim as cleanly as possible with a slight curve which will help with bending the brim later. Add tenon. (figure 6).




Remove from between centers, turn hat and mount with 4 jaw chuck. In stages, cutting only about a half inch at a time, cut brim to the desired thickness. (figure 7). The brim needs to be thin enough for a light to shine through. (figure 8). Caution, be sure that each section of the brim is cut thinly enough because once you move onto the next section you will not be able to go back to the previous

section. A thickness caliber is helpful to determine an even thickness. Cut as cleanly as possible to blend each section. Hollow the body of the hat. (figure 9).



The body has to be turned thin enough for a light to shine through. (figure 10). Another caution, light will shine through end grain better than side grain so use your caliber! Once the body of the hat is thin enough, remove hat from chuck. Using a jam chuck, vacuum chuck or by gently expanding 4 jaw chuck, remount hat to remove tenon. (figure 11). Green aspen is difficult to sand but try your best. (figure 12).



Once sanded, the brim needs to bend upward to achieve the desired cowbot hat shape. While still green, the hat can be formed using rubber bands(figure 13) or by placing the hat iside a plastic tub with a weight to hold it down and in place. (figure 14). The tub below is a child's beach pail bought at Target for \$4. If using rubber bands, be careful as too many bands will cause the hat to overbend and possibly break. If the hat does not bend, consider boiling the hat for 30 minutes to soften the wood enough to promote bending.

Allow the hat to dry thoroughly for two or three days before removing from whichever form used. The hat below (figure 15) was finished with Mahoney's walnut oil. Allow oil to dry thoroughly.
