August Demonstration

Our August demonstration will be by our very own President, Pat Scott (but don't let that stop you from coming to the meeting! ©)

The demo description is: **Butterflies and Stitches**

Wood moves. Wood cracks. Wood has defects.

Wood movement is going to happen no matter what we do. If you use urban wood sooner or later you will have to deal with cracks, splits, bug holes, bark inclusions, and knots. If your roughed out bowl blank cracks during the drying process, do you throw it away? Burn it?

Depending on the size and type of defect there are many ways to deal with the flaw such as CA glue, glue and sawdust, epoxy, inlace, crushed turquoise, etc.

But maybe we shouldn't view defects as a flaw, and should instead look at them as a feature to show off and draw attention to them. Or instead of trying to fill the crack with something, it might be better to leave it as is and just stabilize it.

In this demo I will show two methods that I use for dealing with defects. The first method is to inlay a butterfly patch, and the second method is how to stabilize a crack. Both methods are easy once you know how.

The rules for our monthly turning challenge are:

- Self-assess your level of turning (Beginner, Intermediate or Advanced). Do not judge your skill level by how long you have been turning.
- Fill out a Show-and-Tell form with your name, title of the piece, finish used, etc. All of the forms on our website are now interactive and can be filled out online and printed ahead of time. If you want, you can print a blank form and fill it out by hand, and we will also have blank forms at the meeting.
- The Show-and-Tell forms have a check box for "Turning Challenge" and "Show-and-Tell only". Check the appropriate box.
- To enter the turning challenge, there are 3 folders marked Beginner, Intermediate, and Advanced. Each folder has numbered slips of paper that are color coded to the skill level:

Beginner = Red Intermediate = Blue Advanced = Yellow

- Pick a bag of numbers from your respective skill folder it doesn't matter which number you pick. The Beginner folder only has red numbers, Intermediate only has blue numbers, etc.
- Write the number on your card in case things get mixed up, and place the bag with your numbers on top of your Show-and-Tell card (so people can vote for you). Do not throw the bag away!
- You cannot vote for yourself.

>Group Purchases and Individual Catalog Orders - Roger Holmes

If you ordered a Front Range Woodturner polo shirt or t-shirt, it may be picked up at the August meeting.

INDUSTRIAL ABRASIVES: Industrial Abrasives (IA) is our principal sanding supplies vendor, but individual orders to Klingspor may also be member-processed (see details on the FRW website). Prices for Hook & Loop (H&L) mandrels, and H&L Discs remain the lowest in the marketplace, with the weight of the backing heavier than the competition.

Items on IA's Wholesale Price List but not on the FRW order sheet may be addressed on a case by case basis. Because S&H charges from Pennsylvania for oversized items are so expensive, ordering 1 yd x 1yd sheets of H&L, for example, is cost effective only if at least nine (9) sheets are ordered, resulting in a sheet cost of about \$17.25. With a pair of scissors and a little effort, 250 + 2.25" x 2.25" squares may be cut from each sheet, making the effective cost per disc about 7 cents. The squares may be affixed to a 2" mandrel, the corners clipped off, and the sides crimped around the mandrel - making sanding the inside of bowls much more efficient, and also making the mandrels last longer. The same process may be used for the 3" mandrels, using 3.25" squares.

Supplies of smaller sheets in 25 packs $(3.15" \times 4.5")$ – of the same H&L Aluminum Oxide, Stearate-coated material used in the discs, for \$2.50 + \$2

STARBOND. Starbond is our principal cyanocrylate (CA) glue vendor. Prices increased as of January 2019 (see new order sheets). Our minimum order is \$100, but if we order at a 200+ level, a 15% AAW-related discount kicks in, making S&H essentially free.

Denver Hospice Fundraiser

Donations help raise funds to help families who have to deal with family members in hospice. Christopher's Angels Fund (CAF) has been in existence for over 27 years. This is the 9th year for their annual Poker Run fundraiser.

Bob and Donna Johnson founded Christopher's Angels Fund in memory of their son.



Christopher died in the care of The Denver Hospice when he was two years old. The Johnsons struggled financially during Christopher's illness and were offered no resources to help. They hoped that by creating this fund they could ease the financial stress on other families coping with terminal illness.

How does Christopher's Angels Fund help families served by The Denver Hospice?

Family assistance grants from Christopher's Angels Fund can be requested for non-medical needs like food, mortgage/rent payments, home and auto repairs, special occasions, outings and celebrations, travel expenses, summer camps and other activity fees for children.
