FRW member W.J. (Bill) Smith has graciously stepped up on short notice to give our November demo. Bill was a recipient of the PHEOG Educational Grant award this year and his demo is his payback to the club. Bill used the grant money to attend the Oregon Woodturning Symposium in March and has been busy making boxes since getting back.

Bill was born in Oregon in 1949, but he didn't start woodturning until 2002 after he bought his wife Linda a mini lathe for Christmas. Yes, it was on her wish list! After Bill's 20-year Air Force career, Linda was eager to find him a hobby that would keep him occupied. He joined AAW early on and has been a member of FRWT since 2013. He is also a member of the Pikes Peak Woodturners and South Coast Woodturners in Oregon.

Bill started turning bottle stoppers and selling them in Linda's booths at local craft fairs. Linda told him at the start, "You can turn anything you want, except pens!" Since then, he has expanded his repertoire to cover Christmas ornaments, bowls, hollow forms, kaleidoscopes and a wide array of boxes. Linda is a fabric artist who makes dolls and Christmas ornaments. Bill contributes by making the stands for her dolls and other doll and ornament components. (That's his justification for graduating to a midi-lathe and then a full-size Jet 1632 lathe.)



We went through the steps of turning the birdhouse base and lid, including using forstner bits in jacobs chucks, using a drill press for the bird opening, and other things.

Industrial Abrasives - send orders to Jay Miller Industrial Abrasives is our principal vendor for sanding supplies. Prices for hook & loop mandrels and discs remain the lowest in the marketplace and their backing is a heavier weight than the competition.

Starbond - send orders to Jay Miller

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping free. Sign up for Starbond's newsletter to be notified of sales that beat our wholesale prices.

Craft Supplies - send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.



Ken Rollins made this yarn bowl out of Wisconsin cherry wood and Schacht scrap. He got the woodand cut down the tree first-on his last trip to his brother-in-law's house near Madison. The second bowl, of Florida rosewood and Schacht scrap, will also be a yarn bowl once he cuts the scroll. Both are about a 10" diameter.








Gordon Dalby made this urn for a special person in his life. Measuring 5" x 12", it's made of walnut, spalted pecan, ebony, and dyed black veneer.



Dale Quakenbush made a small hollow form out of bass wood from a burned house in Louisville. He also completed the turning from the Mark Gardner class following the RMWT Symposium. He carved the handles, added texture and dyed it black. He filled it with dead flowers and put it out with his Halloween decorations.



The birdhouse ornament is about 1"x3" and of Schacht cherry with an amethyst bead and bamboo perch; finished with walnut oil. The bird is baked polymer clay with no finish (gravy, or dressing).




Ron Fortune recently made a juniper bowl, about 7"x2", with a shellac sealer finish plus Ack's abrasive and wax. The

shop smelled great while turning it and the color is amazing. The juniper stump was given to him



by a good friend. He also made his first lidded bowl. The base wood is approximately 40-year-old maple from a neighbor, then Ron added a walnut accent strip and walnut lid. Overall, about 6-1/2" diameter, 2-3/4" tall. Not good enough with the gouges to make a "pop" lid, just an average fit.







Blaine Blaesing made this box out of crabapple with a dyed-black finial lid from Schacht scrap. It measures 5" diameter by 6-1/2" high.

Henry Williams took a break from turning and went on a two-week canoe trip with his wife Kit trip down the Green River through Canyonlands National Park in Utah. It was a great trip and the weather was perfect.

The bundles are a mix of hard maple, walnut, cherry, and oak.
