JANUARY DEMONSTRATOR –Linda Ferber Tuesday, January 2nd–In Person and via Zoom

Don Prorak - donprorak@comcast.net Linda Ferber has been turning for more than 20 years and enjoys the creative possibilities and personal challenges that woodturning provides. The opportunity to try woodturning presented itself when her dad auctioned his shop equipment and she purchased his lathe, thinking that with this one piece of equipment she could create with wood. Having no previous experience with a lathe, she took a bowl turning class and found the local chapter of the AAW. Looking back, that one impulse purchase at an auction has made a big impact on her life.

Her early memories of working on craft projects mostly revolved around spending time with family. She enjoys making items that capture a moment or emotion. The first part of the process is the material and shape, selecting the wood, and turning the shape. The final step is applying color to bowls and pin jewelry. Inspiration is drawn from her surroundings and memories, making a connection to these experiences and attempting to interpret them through the shape and color of a piece.

Several of her project articles have been published in *American Woodturner* and *Woodturning FUNdamentals.* Two most recent include a two-part "Inlaid Whimsical Hand Mirror" (Aug 2021) and "More Fun with Button Inlay: Jewelry, Magnets, & More" (Nov 2021). She has facilitated three Women in Turning Virtual Exchanges. Two articles describing the events - "Ripples Become a Tsunami" (2021) and "Breaking Boundaries and Removing Limitations" (Apr 2021), were co-written with Marie Anderson.

Transparent wood is incredibly strong, outperforming plastic and glass: In tests measuring how easily materials fracture or break under pressure, transparent wood came out around three times stronger than transparent plastics like Plexiglass and about 10 times tougher than glass.

Industrial Abrasives - send orders to Jay Miller Industrial Abrasives is our principal vendor for sanding supplies. Prices for hook & loop mandrels and discs remain the lowest in the marketplace and their backing is a heavier weight than the competition.

Starbond - send orders to Jay Miller

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping free. Sign up for Starbond's newsletter to be notified of sales that beat our wholesale prices.

Craft Supplies – send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply – send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Debra Higley-Feldman made this 5" lacewood bowl with an ambrosia maple base. The lid is spalted and Schacht maple. The finish is shellac/Danish wood oil/carnauba wax. She also made a spinning top of Schacht maple, decorated with Tombow watercolor pens and finished with lacquer.





Jerry Gallagher made this gnome box of basswood and oak. It measures 10" tall.
