Keith grew up in the Midwest, but made Colorado his home in 1981. Living in Boulder, he took advantage of all the outdoor activities available. Rock climbing in particular became a passion of his. That pursuit took him to many of the



climbing areas of the US and various international destinations as well. To fund these adventures Keith followed another lifelong passion of his, woodworking. Starting in a factory on the night shift, making "butcher block" furniture, he quickly rose through the ranks. He made his way through various cabinet shops, ending with a designer making very eclectic furniture. In 1989 he struck out on his own, developing his own clientele and designs under the name K2 Woodworks. Keith still takes on the occasional furniture commission.

1998 saw his change in focus from furniture to woodturning. Keith worked the craft show circuit as well as making for wholesale accounts. Moving from Boulder to the small town of Salida precipitated another change in life for Keith, as it was there that he met his wife Catherine. 18 months living in England was followed by a return to Salida. Keith now fills his workdays with production architectural turning, furniture, teaching and demonstrations, as well as any old weird job that comes in. For fun he is still exploring Colorado, often on his dual-sport motorbike.

With his background in fine art, and a love of the truly utilitarian, Keith's work can be noted for its clean lines, smooth curves and tight detail. Sometimes whimsical, often classical, Keith enjoys working in a broad body of work and is hard to pigeonhole.

At our April meeting, Keith will discuss bowl turning. That sounds basic, but there is a wealth of knowledge behind him on this subject. As a production turner, he has learned the hard way all sorts of lessons that turners of any ability will find useful. This is a fast-moving demo as there is so much to cover. He'll go through wood selection, cutting from the log, rough turning, drying, re-turning, sanding, turning green, how to season, finish, and even sell the bowls. Perhaps he'll turn a dry and green bowl for contrast.




Larry Hughes will have a segmented turning class in his shop on June 15th.

Starbond is our CA glue supplier. Our minimum order is \$100, but we receive an additional discount at \$200, making shipping free. Sign up for Starbond's newsletter to be notified of sales that beat our wholesale prices.

Craft Supplies - send orders to Ted Mellin Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply - send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.





PERPETUAL TURNINGS

Larry Hughes was playing around with an old idea and placed these in a gallery. The small balloon is walnut and maple; the larger balloon is sapele and

maple. But somehow, he couldn't get either one to launch!






Ken Rollins made a 5" jar from recycled mahogany furniture and Schacht scrap. It has a convex mirror in the bottom that came from the wood


raffle years ago. It will be a birthday present for his granddaughter.




Blaine Blaesing made this small 4-1/2" vase from segmented pieces of scrap, orienting the grain in different directions. He finished it with several coats of wipe-on polyurethane. He also made a 7" walnut bowl and filled the cracks with a turquoise inlay. That was finished with walnut oil.



Curt put it at 25% as approximately a jumbo chicken egg and then printed it. He then did one at 20% to use as the inside template for hollowing for an egg-shaped box. He held the two printed pages up to a light to see how it might turn out. Your results may vary...:) If you want to make an egg-shaped box, remember to "stretch" the egg at the seam for the box tenon material.







He made the thinwalled box out of torrefied (roasted) curly soft maple.

He also made a chisel handle that he could use by pushing from the palm of his hand instead of the fingertips. Of claro walnut finished with wipe-on poly, he made it wide at the heel to spread the pressure across his hand.



Rick Cantwell picked out a piece of spalted butternut at last month's wood raffle. It made a handsome 8.5" x 3" bowl. He sealed it with shellac and finished it with three-part oil.





Rick Elich made a pitcher inspired by an oil painting his father painted in college circa 1950.



Debra Higley-Feldman made several hollow forms

from aspen, the tallest of which is 12". The lids are maple and cherry, and the bowl base is myrtle. Thin CA stabilized the red growth. The finishes are mostly walnut oil/carnauba wax, and a Tombow watercolor bowl rim. The aspen tree had years of a very hard, diseased life; it healed, followed by years of healthy growth. Then someone chopped it down.

The 5.5"x2" silver maple cocobolo lidded box looks a bit like an artsy rollerball-type deodorant stick. The finish was CA followed by Minwax floor wax.
