Emma Cook (known within the woodturning community as The Tiny Turner) has been involved with the craft since she was 16. Now, 24 years later, Emma is the youngest Chair of the Register of Professional Turners in the UK. In addition she runs her own woodturning business selling kits and supplies to woodturn-



ers and crafters (<u>www.thetinyturner.co.uk</u>) as well as demonstrating throughout the UK, Europe and now America and Australia.

Emma is a popular demonstrator and is regularly invited back to clubs where she teaches people how to make the various projects using the kits she has developed. Over the years, she has taught woodturning to hundreds of people with her laid-back and accommodating style.

As well as woodturning, Emma had an apprenticeship in traditional wood carving for many years and enjoys combining the two disciplines. Her proudest piece of work is 'Errol' - a dragon she carved based on a drawing by Paul Kidby of the Discworld novel character (created by Sir Terry Pratchett). It took her over six years to complete but sadly she does not have much time to carve these days. However, by combining the turning and carving together, Emma is able to keep her skill set active and this is something she loves to pass on where she can.

Emma has also ventured into working with resin over the last few years and works mainly with ure-

In May, **Dennis Fanning** demonstrated how to make live-edge bowls. We had a full class who had blanks of wet apple, Russian olive, maple, aspen and walnut to choose from. Dennis prefers to start the bowl without rounding the corners on the bandsaw, but also demonstrated how to do so using round templates. He showed how to mount the blank between centers at first, to frequently adjust the center of the piece to make sure the edges are even, especially important in elongated bowls. Once length and width are symmetrical we made a tenon for the bowl. We truly appreciate Dennis's teaching skills and individual attention to all who attended.

All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8"(3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025"thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Debra Higley made this 3x6" lidded box of cherry and walnut with an agate inlay, inspired by Raleigh Lockhart's great LOTL





class in April. The finish is

mostly tung oil and carnauba/Minwax. The 3x7" stand of redheart, walnut, and dogwood burl and 5" redheart weed pot are finished with Danish wood oil and carnauba.

Carl Fulbright made a few more wig stands for our club donations to the local cancer center. They're made from a variety of miscellaneous woods, approximately 12" tall, 6" in diameter, airbrushed with acrylic and finished with spray-on polyurethane.







Todd Bowen made this ash hollow form from a tree limb that reportedly was a victim of Emerald Ash Bore Beatle. He found no evidence of the bug in the cambium layer. The wood threw very little moisture when turning green. It was finished with Tried and True original. He also made a 5x6" hollow form of desert ironwood. He was going for a basket illusion effect but cut the beads larger than he felt necessary for the illusion. Also, he just liked the way it looked.

That was also finished with Tried and True Original.

He left the wands unfinished so he could practice using his pyrography burner to embellish them. The wood was recovered from old bed mattress supports and is a little soft to take the burn lines evenly. But they finish nicely with a wipe-on poly to show the grain. In last month's FRW newsletter, there was a call for donations to show our thanks to Schacht Spindle Co. for their years of support of our club. Curt completed a





couple globe ornaments, some icicle ornaments and a couple magic wands to show his appreciation to the folks at Schacht. Even though Curt is in Texas now, he still had Schacht wood in his stash to use in a couple of the projects! He also wanted to thank **Dave Hawley** and many others that work to go over to Schact and collect the wood to bring to the FRW wood exchange.



Gordon Dalby recently turned some juniper (pfizter) root, a beautiful wood. The bowl is about 5" in diameter and the unfinished vase is 8" tall.

A PLEA FROM A WOODTURNING MENTOR



For years I have been mentoring new turners, and I am normally stunned by how much purchasing has taken place before new turners have decided to seek out mentors. It's not like a FRW member must pay mentors – it's free! And there are no limitations on how many mentors can be consulted! Yes – mentors have differing opinions – so seek information from more than one mentor before making purchasing decisions!

So...this is a plea - you can save a lot of money, and time, by consulting with / listening to multiple mentors (not just me) BEFORE spending that hardearned cash. Spending big bucks on a lathe that is poorly made and won't last very long, tools that won't sharpen well, and sets of tools made from "junk" steel may all be avoided. Spending big bucks on handles when they are easily made on the lathe (from almost free wood) is too common. And....the best tool steel is often the same cost (sometimes maybe 10% more, sometimes less) than the total junk. Data is readily available to enable good decisionmaking!

Seeking out information, and purchasing one or two tools at a time, with a focus on turning what you want to turn, is my plea. I believe you will be happier, and your wallet / pocketbook will definitely be happier!
