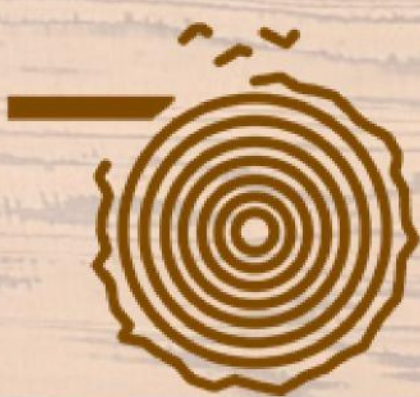

Growing up in New Mexico, Bob has been involved in some form of woodworking since he was a teenager. He moved to Colorado in 1989 following work. Somewhere around 2009, Bob picked up an old 1930s lathe at a garage sale, refurbished it and started learning how to turn. Over the course of the next few years, in his off time, he slowly started teaching himself with the help of youtube and lots of research. He really fell in love with turning.



A few years later, Bob realized there were two local woodturning clubs and a pen club within 45 minutes of him. He joined all of them and has been a member of them all since then. He has been the PHEOG chair for Front Range Woodturners and has been president of Rocky Mountain Woodturners.

He and his wife Cindy also fell in love with resin casting. They made and sold thousands of hybrid blanks to woodturners all over the world over the course of about five years. Their blanks could be found at our local Woodcraft in Loveland and were also available online at turnerswarehouse.com and ringsupplies.com. While this was a thriving business, a few years ago the Franklins quit making blanks to regain focus on woodturning as a hobby.

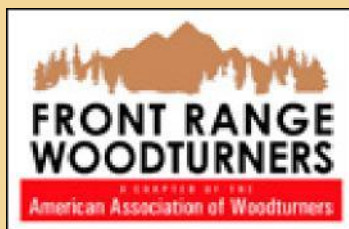

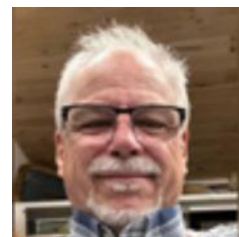

PHEOG PROGRAM

The Pete Holtus Educational Opportunity Grant program provides grant money to FRW members to further their woodturning education through an application process. Examples of grant requests include attending a symposium, workshop, or training class. Those FRW members awarded grants do not repay the club with money, but must complete a return benefit to the club no later than one year from the grant award. Examples include giving a demo at club meetings, brown-bag demos, or mentoring sessions. Some past recipients have written an article for the newsletter or taught a Hands-on Woodturning or Ladies of the Lathe class. Be sure to be very specific about your payback plan; this is the primary basis for evaluating the overall value to the club. There are many creative ways to pay the learning forward to the club, and the committee will consider any useful idea. In addition to individual training, grants to schools teaching woodturning are also available.

See complete rules and application on the FRW website (<https://www.frontrangewoodturners.org/>) located in the “Education” tab under “PHEOG” subheading. You must be a FRW member who joined before March 15, 2025. To be a member in good standing, make sure your 2026 dues are paid before submitting an application. FRW members can apply for grants more than once, but only once every three years.

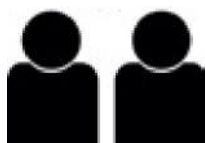
This year the PHEOG grant committee is composed of Ken Rollins, Todd Bowen, and Erika Meeske. These members are not eligible for a grant this year.

Your completed grant application must be completed and submitted electronically by the March 15, 2026 deadline. Applying ahead of time will enable the committee to review the application and make sure it is clearly understood before the deadline. The committee will forward their report to the Executive Committee after the March 15 deadline, and the results will be announced at the FRW general meeting in April.

In the past the maximum individual grant limit has been set at \$1250, and only registration, tuition, or workshop fees have been reimbursed. If you receive a grant of \$600 or more you will receive a IRS 1099 form showing the amount for the 2026 tax year. Grants of \$599 or less do not generate a IRS 1099 form.

 There is no longer a minimum order amount, we now get 25% off retail prices on ALL products. There is a flat \$4.99 shipping fee and no tax. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8" (3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025" thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Carl Fulbright made a few special wig stands for the cancer center. The snowmen are aspen and walnut with maple top and bottom and airbrush painted. The patriotic ones are turned from a wide variety of woods and airbrush painted. Carl also has a bag of miscellaneous

wooden toys he has made. When he happens across a kid who looks like they need one, he gives them one and shows them how to use it. Just kind of a fun thing to do.



Bill Leigher made a couple of pecan bowls. The wood came from his wintertime club in Florida and the symmetry is really nice.



Mark Tanzyus recently turned a small vase out of worm hole aspen and a small box out of ash.



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Henry Williams completed the chess set by turning the knights as a ring turning, weighting the holly pieces close to the cocobolo pieces, felting the bottoms, and turning signed leather disks for the bottom of the kings only. It's based on a 1940's design by Man Ray. The finish is EEE Ultrashine and Renaissance Wax. The kings are 3 3/8" tall, and it's a 34 piece set with an extra queen for pawn promotion.



Debra Higley made an 8x3.5" bowl of big leaf maple. The outside finish is Danish wood oil and carnauba, inside is Odie's Oil.



Todd Bowen made this ash bowl finished with India ink dye and white embellishing wax. It was finished with Tried and True original. He also made this Claro walnut platter with turquoise, finished with Waterlox. This material had so much silica in it that he basically had to keep his sharpener running



to get through the material. Thanks, Roper, for this beautiful piece of wood.

Having been turning for about a year, **Roger Boss** made quite a few items for holiday gifts. He made



two coffee scoops, one from wenge and one from maple, finished with



Yorkshire Grit Black and topped with two coats of Mylands friction polish. He also made two ice cream scoops, one from wenge and one from coffeewood, finished the same way as the coffee scoops. The salt and pepper shakers are from an oak log, about 4" high. The seam ripper, from coffeewood, has a 3" long handle and was



finished with friction polish. The walnut bottle stopper for a double magnum wine bottle used the original cork for the stopper. It's about 3.5" tall and 2.25" wide.



Last was an oak bottle opener with a 5.5" long handle.
