Originally from Chicago, Don Pro-rak is a musician, music teacher, composer, and woodturner. His musical career has encompassed classical, jazz, rock, pop, musical theater and world music, and he taught music at all levels from elementary to university and adults. For the last several decades he has focused on idad & Tobago and has travelled there many times to perform and experience the culture.



Don started woodworking in the 1980s with a circular saw, drill, router and a few cheap hand tools. He purchased a Shopsmith and started to play around with woodturning. As he describes it, “Back then I had very few tools and even less knowledge; now I have a lot of tools!” He got serious about woodturning around 2012 after meeting Bruce Perry and joined FRW in 2014. Since retiring from public school teaching in 2016, he has taken an active role in the club, serving as Youth Mentor (2017 – present), Group Purchase Chair (2022) VP/Program Director (2020, 21, & 23), and President (2024– 25). He is also a member of AAW, as well as the Rocky Mountain, Pikes Peak, and Pueblo clubs. As a demonstrator he has appeared at all the local clubs as well as the Rocky Mountain Woodturning Symposium, and has taught classes for LOTL, HOW, and the Brown Bag Demos.

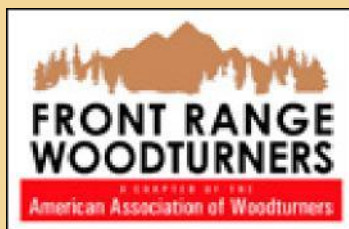

Carroll, and Roberto Ferrer. He particularly enjoys turning pieces with "Wings, Rings, & Off-Center Things".

For our February demo, Don will show his design of a square-to-round box with spinning top lid. The box body starts from a square cross grain blank of dry wood with top and bottom curving to-wards center. The box body is hollowed and can have holes drilled in the flat sides. The end grain lid doubles as a spinning top which can be spun on the inverted box bottom. The piece is enhanced with carving and/or pyrography. The project involves careful layout, cross-grain and spindle turning, and hollowing technique.

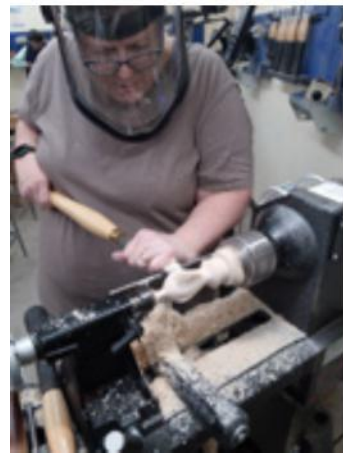

In January, the LOTL learned “outside-in” turning, demonstrated by our own **Debra Higley-Feldman**. Using Schacht maple, we learned how to do the initial glue-up of four equal pieces to form the inside of our hot air balloon ornaments. After turning a curve, these were separated, then reglued to the form the outside of the ornaments.



In February we will be turning eggs and adding a wide variety of embellishments. The class will be taught by **Henry Williams**.

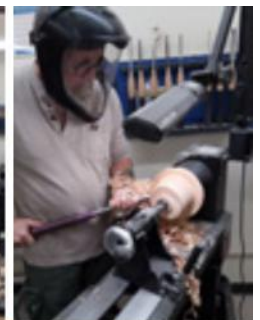

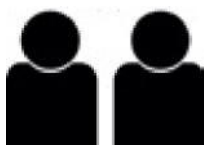

Jay Miller gave a great HOW class on turning mini cowboy hats with wet wood blanks. He showed the use of a bowl gouge in turning the tenon on what would be the top of the hat, shaping the hat, flipping to turn the inside, and sanding on low speed and coarse grit while still on the lathe. He also talked about steaming the wood once turned and using a jig to shape the rim of the hat. Others have used rubber bands to bend the rim, but he has found use of a jig to get a more symmetric bend.

All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8" (3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025" thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

These are a few of the balloons

Debra Higley turned for the January LOTL class.

The outside-inside balloons, made from Schacht maple, are up to 2" dia x 4" high. The finish is Tenbow watercolor pens, Golden mica acrylic, and spray lacquer.



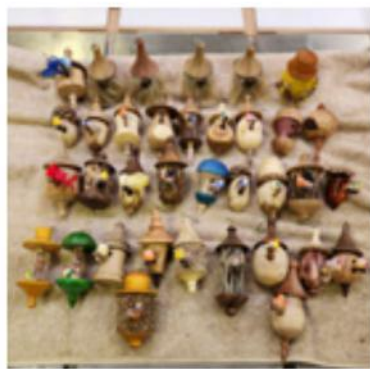
Russell Dewey has been working on several projects. Eventually they will all be donated to the local zoo as part of their annual fund raiser in June. These types of items as well as the numerous Christmas tree ornaments he provides for them generate quite a bit of money for their mission and expenses.



First is a maple bowl, 8-1/2" x 3-1/2", then a burl (unknown wood) hollow form measuring 5" x 3" and a burl lidded box, 4-1/2" x 3".



All were finished with wipe-on poly. The last picture is of the ornaments for their 2025 Christmas tree they put in the entrance to the gift shop.



Matt Price turned an 8" tall salt/pepper mill set from cherry stock with thin maple and walnut ripped strips to differentiate the salt and pepper respectively. He found an old beat up salt/pepper mill set at a thrift store for \$3.99 and noted that the mechanisms



were in great shape. The new mills he made were based on the measurements of that second-hand hardware and it worked very well. The pieces were finished with two coats of Tried and True Original and after a few weeks, four coats of wipe-on polyurethane.



Lavonne Kaiser made a variety of kitchen tools from Schacht hardwood maple scraps. About 10-12" long, she finished them with lemon oil.



New member and fairly new turner **Tyler Johnson** got a buffing system for Christmas which he says is a total game changer. He's happy with these new pieces made from sapele, a 6" bowl and 4" tall vase. Both were finished with carnauba wax.



Kim Komitor made this box of maple burl along with walnut and turquoise. It measures 3-1/2" x 3-1/2".



Scott DeWeese finished several platters this month: a 16" cedar platter with reed embellishments in pyrography, colored India inks and finished with matte Osmo Oil, a 16" silver maple platter with basket illusion design, India ink and finished with matte Osmo Oil and a hard maple platter with pyrography and India ink and finished with spray lacquer.



Keith Motzner made this spalted cherry bowl from a blank he won as the door prize at Roper's 2025 shop tour.



Todd Bowen made a 12" Claro Walnut platter and a small bowl with a story. A dear friend approached him about turning something with a turquoise inlay and her father's ashes. Seems the funeral home wanted to sell her a crystal heart with a place for those ashes within it for \$800. Her father was a carpenter and the crystal option just did not fit. She had had her dad's ashes for a number of months when she approached Todd, asking if he could inlay her dad's ashes with turquoise. She wanted whatever he did to have some rough edges (apparently, like her dad). The pieces were



finished with Waterlox. He also made an eco-friendly, lightweight, portable, locally sourced, energy-efficient walnut boom box finished with Odie's 2c.

Curt Vogt got in a little turning this month and there seems to be a pile of ornament parts waiting to be completed. At least he remembered to take a photo of these four magic wands. They're made of curly maple and recycled Idunno wood, finished with a rubbed-in wipe-on poly.
