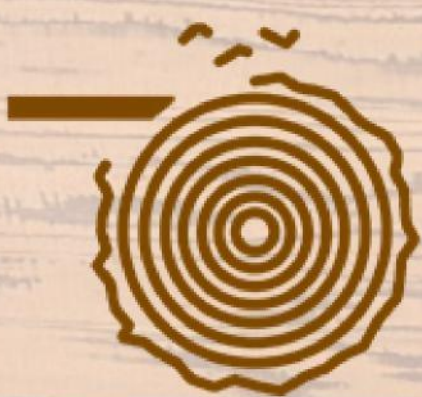

Kalia spent the first part of her woodworking career making furniture and cabinets, with a little side trip into guitar repair and making guitar parts. But she loved turning from the first time a friend plonked her down in front of his lathe and chucked in a piece of madrone. Fun fact, she still uses the carving mallet she made that day, her first turned object, and has been extending and improving her skills ever since. Kalia's woodturning specialty is functional bowls and plates. They feel good. They're useful and beautiful, and they can last a lifetime. A well-made bowl can be a wonderful way to honor the tree the wood came from, and a wonderful way to grace a table.

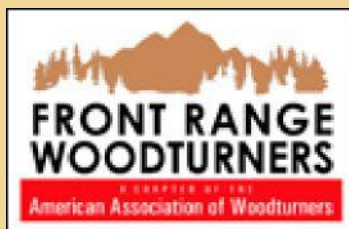

Advanced: Scott DeWeese & Rick Orr (tie)

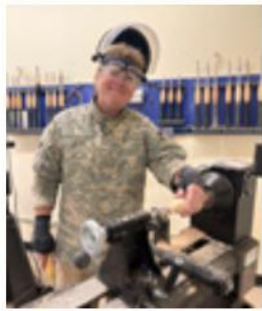

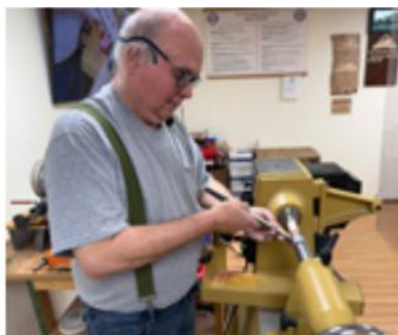
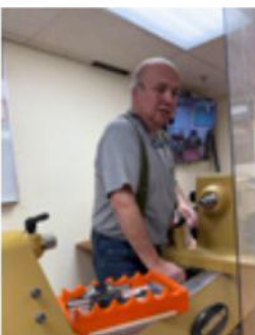


On March 3rd, **Pat Scott** will demonstrate how to use spindle turning skills to make a pepper mill.

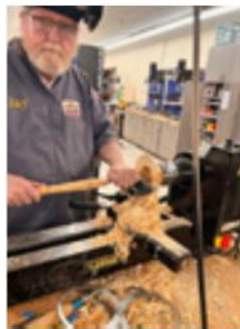

PHEOG PROGRAM

If you have been waiting for the last minute to apply for a PHEOG grant... Good news! The time has come. The Pete Holtus Educational Opportunity Grant program provides grant money to FRW members to further their woodturning education through an application process. Examples of grant requests include attending a symposium, workshop, or training class. Those FRW members awarded grants do not repay the club with money, but must complete a return benefit to the club no later than one year from the grant award. Examples of payback include giving a demo at club meetings, brown-bag demos, or mentoring sessions. Some past recipients have written an article for the newsletter or taught a Hands-On-Woodturning or Ladies of the Lathe class. Be sure to be very specific about your payback plan; this is the primary basis for evaluating the overall value to the club. FRW wants to make sure that you receive useful training and plan to share that learning at whatever skill level you possess. There are many creative ways to pay the learning forward to the club, and the committee will consider any useful idea. In addition to individual training, grants to schools teaching woodturning are also available.

You must be a FRW member who joined before March 15, 2025. To be a member in good standing, make sure your 2026 dues are paid before submitting an application. FRW members can apply for grants more than once, but only once every three years.

Read and make sure you understand the rules found on the FRW web page (<https://www.frontrangewoodturners.org/>) located in the “Education” tab under “PHEOG” subheading.

Fill out the application on-line at the same page (<https://www.frontrangewoodturners.org/>) located in the “Education” tab under “PHEOG” subheading. When you have submitted your application you should receive an email acknowledgement within a day or so. If you don’t, then use the PHEOG chair email link to check the status of your application. The application deadline is **March 15, 2026**. Applying ahead of time will enable the committee to review the application and make sure it is clearly understood before the deadline. The committee will

forward their report to the Executive Committee after the March 15 deadline, and the results will be announced at the FRW general meeting in April.

This year the PHEOG grant committee is composed of Ken Rollins, Todd Bowen, and Erika Meeske. These members are not eligible for a grant this year.

In the past the maximum individual grant limit has been set at \$1250, and only registration, tuition, or workshop fees have been reimbursed. If you receive a grant of \$600 or more you will receive a IRS 1099 form showing the amount for the 2026 tax year. Grants of \$599 or less do not generate a IRS 1099 form.

All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8" (3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025" thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

Remember that great shop tour we had last summer at Environmental Tree Care?

Roper raffled off a large slab of spalted maple and Keith was

the lucky winner. The two bowls were made from some of that wood. The slab was a bit punky in places, but they turned out really nice. Beautiful wood to create beautiful bowls. Thanks, Roper!



high. The stems are spalted pecan and the tops are walnut. The crabapple hollow form is 4" wide x 10" high. Everything is finished with wipe-on poly.

Ken Rollins made this 'ugly duckling' bowl out of wood that no one wanted. At the end of the January FRW meeting, after the tables were all put away, this cedar wood that Steve had hauled in was left, feeling unwanted and sad. So Ken took it home and made this bowl. It's about 3" x 5", finished with penetrating oil and poly.



Debra Higley's inside-out balloons are very popular. After posting photos of some that she made, several people asked if they could have one. So she made more. The finish is watercolor pen and lacquer. She also made a lidded box of mesquite (thanks, Marcee!) with a turquoise inlay. That's finished with Odie's oil. All the turnings are about 2"x4".



Russell Dewey worked on several projects. The maple tri-corner bowl was our club challenge inspired by Don's past demonstrations. It is 6" wide x 4" high. The mushroom salt and pepper shakers are 3" wide x 6"

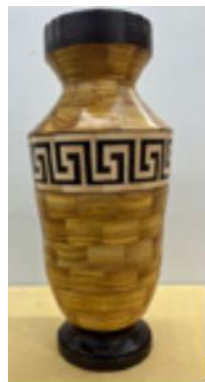


Carl Fulbright recently finished this large segmented vase (or maybe a pot) measuring 13" tall by 11" diameter. Made with maple, walnut and some unidentified wood. It's finished inside with Mohawk wipe-on and carnauba wax on the outside.



Henry Williams made this pillar candle stand from mahogany and accented with Emma Cook's Kraken chameleon flakes. It's 3" diameter, 4" tall, finished with EEE and Shellawax.

Roger Boss made this change valet. It started as a large, 9 x 2-1/2" spalted maple blank. Things were going well. But near the end of turning, the bowl blew apart. Rather than throwing it in with the scrap, he decided to keep turning, and ended up making this valet. Happy little accidents do happen! It now measures 5x4x1" and was finished with Danish oil.



For his latest segmented piece, **Gordon Dalby** decided to try a Greek design. Measuring 9"x4-1/2", the vase is composed of wenge, maple and canary woods. A student of his at Covenant Living (Tom Thorpe) turned this, his second bowl. It's 10"x4-1/2", of walnut, zebra, red heart and honey locust woods.



Todd Bowen turned this large claro walnut bowl with turquoise inlay. It measures 7" tall by 14" across. The finish is Waterlox Original. The claro walnut was provided by Roder. what would we do without him?



Pat Hannon made these two briar pieces which measure about 1.5 x 1.5". The insert in the one is a chrysocola stone cut and polished years ago on a stone cutter. The insert on the other is a cabachon made on the lathe from African blackwood, copper and brass. The finish is Tru-oil.



Mickey Jackson turned these three segmented bowls for prizes for a seniors Valentines party at his church. They are from various species, mostly maple, cedar and mahogany. There are eight segments per row. He finished them with Scratch Free, Myland's Friction Polish, and Dr. Kirk's GOAT Wax.



Curt Vogt got a good amount of shop time in this month and created a new batch of magic wands, three Sirocco pen kits made with acrylic and bacote and finished with CA, and then finally completed some ornaments of maple and post oak with finials of maple, cherry, and ipe. He has been experimenting with Solarez UV cured finish on the magic wands and ornaments. He brushed it on and then wiped off all the excess with paper towels before starting the cure with a UV flashlight. It took a bit of direct sunlight to really set the finish as his flashlight is not that strong. It gave a natural wood satin look. He will try a deep gloss experiment at some point.



Blaine Blaesing made this 12.5 x 4" ash vase, which seemed to be calling for something extra after turning. So he selected some of the grain lines and woodburned a series of dots to outline them. He finished it with three coats of lacquer.
