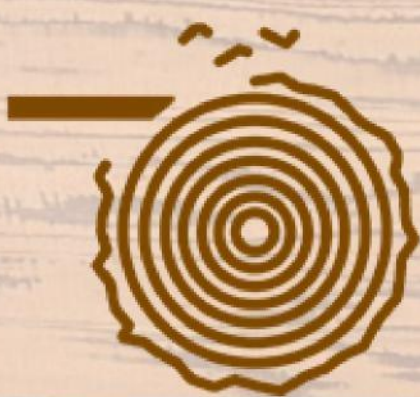

Our demonstrator for April is Pat Carroll. Working as a builder and carpenter, woodturning was a craft Pat knew very little about before 2001. After some research, he was fortunate to find a woodturner in his nearest town—one of the finest turners in Ireland. Willie Stedmond, a founding member of the Irish



Woodturners Guild, was giving night classes, and Pat attended several. Pat's first advice to anyone interested in woodturning: take lessons and join a club. He did both, and along the way he met generous, talented people who helped and encouraged him enormously.

Over the years Pat's turning has progressed through many areas of this wonderful craft. There were long periods when work and other commitments left little or no time for turning, but the draw was always there. The need to make shavings!

He is very proud of the recognition he has received from fellow turners and artists for his work, demonstrations, and award-winning pieces. He views it as a great honor to have his work included in collections around the world.

When Mark Baker of GMC *Woodturning* magazine approached Pat to write for the publication, he was completely taken aback and initially declined. Thankfully, Mark persevered and offered his support. With Mark's encouragement, Pat has since had many articles published. More recently, with the rise of virtual woodturning, he has embraced delivering IRDs (Interactive Remote Demonstrations). 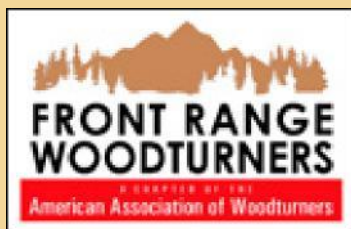

For the March class, **Pat Scott** demonstrated the many steps involved in making peppermills. He gave lots of tips on how to get the holes accurate and true, showed his ‘game changer’ tools and discussed the importance of good design. Participants got all the various holes drilled, enabling them to finish the final shaping at home.



On April 7th, **Dave Hawley** will demonstrate how to make Scottish spurtles--narrow, wood stirring rods dating back to the 15th century. This will be another great spindle turning project.

BROWN BAG DEMO

At the March BBD, **Raleigh Lockhart** discussed how to take great photos of our work. A mini photo booth eliminates distracting backgrounds and helps viewers focus on the piece. He recommends adding props for additional interest and to show scale.



Rick Orr will be the presenter for our April Brown Bag Demo on April 14th, and you don't want to miss this one! He will be giving “The Complete Guide to an Introduction to Surface Embellishments.”

Included will be wire burning with KC wire burner (and how to make your own wire burners), color, texturing, wire brushing, chatter work, and wood burning including how to lay out and wood burn stitching on a wood baseball.

There was a full class for Pat Scott's demonstration of how to make a set of small spice bowls.



The next H.O.W class will be held on April 21st. **Keith Motzner** will teach Woodturning 101, an introduction to woodturning / mastering the fundamentals. This class is designed to bridge the gap between watching demonstrations and successfully executing cuts on your own lathe. By focusing on foundational techniques, you will eliminate bad habits, improve safety, and move past the frustrations that hold many beginners back.

The Pete Holtus Educational Opportunity Grant program provides grant money to FRW members to further their woodturning education through an application process. The 2026 application deadline was March 15th.

Examples of grant requests include attending a symposium, workshop, or training class. Those FRW members awarded grants do not repay the club with money, but must complete a return benefit to the club no later than one year from the grant award. Examples of payback include giving a demo at club meetings, brown-bag demos, or mentoring sessions. Some past recipients have written an article for the newsletter or taught a Hands-On-Woodturning or Ladies of the Lathe class. The PHEOG program enables FRW members to receive useful training and share that learning. In addition to individual training, grants to schools teaching woodturning are also available.

For the 2026 application year, no one applied for a grant. Plan ahead for next year and the opportunity to learn and share.

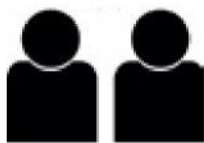

There is no longer a minimum order amount, we now get 25% off retail prices on ALL products. There is a flat \$4.99 shipping fee and no tax. Craft Supplies sells a very wide range of products. Our minimum group purchase is \$1000. Members may not place individual orders to get a discount.

Spence Industrial Supply – send orders to Ted Mellin We will be purchasing band saw blades from Spence once a year, in April, unless a member can meet the minimum order in another quarter. All blades are carbon steel flexback in 1/4" (4 tpi), 3/8" (3 tpi), or 1/2" (4 tpi) width, hook tooth, and .025" thick. Our minimum buy is 20 blades for each width in any length.

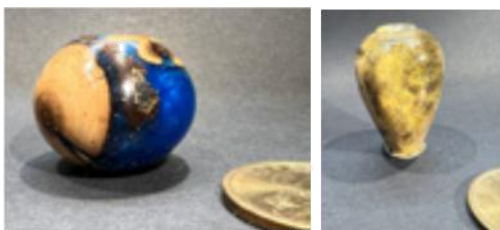

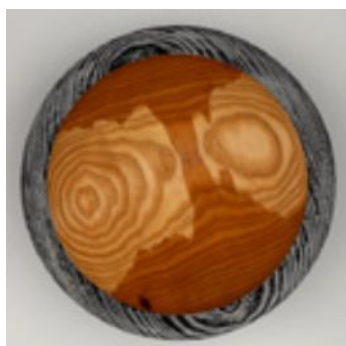
Here are some projects that members have been working on this month.



Here are a few of **Bear Limvere's** recent miniature turnings. They're made of various burls and cast acrylic. The third pic is a two-piece "inside-out" turning. The last is inspired by the current trend of casting colored pencils, so he tried colored toothpicks to make the scale right.



Debra Higley made this 6"x12" bubinga hollow form with an elm burl and Schacht maple/India ink lid and offset-turned finial. The finish is Odie's Oil.



Todd Bowen made these two pieces as a direct result of Kalia Klivan's course at Rockler, using two different colors of milk paint. He used a topcoat of Danish Oil to complete the project. It was a very fun and satisfying course.



Bill Leigher recently finished this cake stand, turned from three pieces of maple and then assembled. He got the plan from an online turning club with Glenn Lucas.

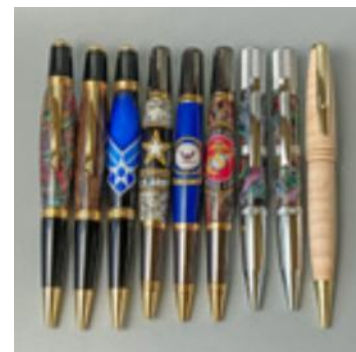


Kim Komitor made this 7-1/2" tall hollow form lidded vase. It's composed of walnut, box elder and pink ivory with a tung oil finish.



Dennis Fanning made this unusual floor lamp using 21 wooden bowls made from pear, elm, apple, walnut, ash, honey locust and sycamore, with a Danish finish.

Curt Vogt had to repair the quill on his lathe this past month and that slowed down some projects while he waited for parts. However, once the repairs were done, he made some pen kits. An assortment of different kits and materials here, but of note are the series of Armed Forces Tribute Pens he started. He's got a few more to go to fill out the set.



Pat Scott has been having a lot of fun making spice bowls. When he stopped, he had over 100 bowls from 2" to 3.5".



Most of them are maple, with cherry, mahogany, oak, and honey locust thrown in. (Believe it or not, he's got more that aren't in the picture.)



Cathie McLean made this decorative dish for a family member. It's made from birch with many hours of wood burning and coloring with colored pencils, the first time she's played with adding some color. The finish is shellac and lacquer.



After taking Pat Scott's LOTL pepper mill class, **Brenda Blaesing** got inspired to make more of them, in several different styles. The woods are maple, walnut (thanks, Robyn!), oak, elm and flaming box elder. One of the oak mills was lightly torched to highlight the grain pattern. The finish is walnut oil.



Blaine Blaesing made this 11 x 5" vase from wood he got at one of the club's wood exchanges last year. It's composed of six pieces of walnut, laminated together in different grain orientations. He also made a cluster of mushrooms out of red juniper, white juniper, willow and honey locust. They range in size from 5" to 13" high.
